Backed by a small call centre team who take out-of-hours calls, our duty Stand-By Officers co-ordinate the expertise and equipment needed to deal with the immediate problem. For instance if there is a vehicle collision or fallen tree an Emergency Response crew will work with the police or fire-brigade to get the road or footway cleared and made safe. This may involve removing debris, putting live electrical connections out of harm's way and erecting temporary barriers and warning signs.

This is called 'making safe' – it may not always look pretty, but it's a crucial step to reopening the road or footway swiftly, making sure it is safe to use. And if there has been a fuel spillage or safety critical defect it may be necessary to arrange for the road to be resurfaced or patched as happened recently under the A12 at Howe Green following a collision. As with the seasonal gritting service, many emergency repairs are carried out overnight, at weekends and holidays unnoticed by the public.



Continued mild weather in November enables more pothole progress

With the main routes in good condition following our seasonal summer capital programmes and a long period of generally favourable weather, work to fill potholes has emphatically shifted to concentrate on local roads, with the new injection (jet) patchers, thermal patching and recycling providing 2,750 potholes fixes so far, using Essex County Council extra £2.5m

In November we also repaired an additional 1,472 risk-assessed safety-critical potholes and 882 defects on pavements either by spot-fixing or eradicating them entirely by replacing the surface along a length. We also repaired 58 defects on what we call "remote footways", i.e. those not next to the carriageway. Of the 643 'Top 10' defects nominated so far by County Members, over 104 and counting have been patched, as we group them into efficient batches for work.

Main road drains in Brentwood, Maldon, Uttlesford, Rochford and Tendring have been jetted and cleaned with additional work to clear long-term problems in Basildon, Braintee, Chelmsford, Colchester and Epping. An astonishing 11,535 drains have been cleared across Essex during November. The data below lists potholes fixed per district/city/borough in November, not including the Top 20 pothole programme.
